Dear Prof. Kohr:

I have just received your letter of Nov. 12. I understand how anxious is our friend Mr. Alexander; I have received two letters from him already (a card and a few lines), and I sent him o/o Embassy of the United States two other cards in a disguised language I hope he will receive and understand. Because, as you know, my name and our relation must not be known by nobody.

My friends are not in Madrid, they are meeting in France; I have received news from them; they will be back soon, and they will visit Mr. Alexander. But you can not give the news so far, it would be too dangerous if anything happens. I suggest you to write Mr. Alexander, more or less, the following, of course without any mention of my name Galíndez:

"The other day (or "I had news from") our friend from Rutgers University, he looks fine. His folks are now in Western Europe having good time as they study the situation: he had seen them recently; it seems they will be home very soon with many things to talk about, specially the new trends of the movement. Be patient and you will know too."
